# Watershed Management Areas

- Countywide Water Quality Strategic Plan
- County, city managers, and later special district general managers
- Several years under development

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## **Current Approach: Accomplishments**

- NPDES Permit Compliance
  - Few Enforcement Actions
  - Regional Boards are generally pleased with regional water quality efforts
- ✤ Fewer Beach Postings

## Higher Levels of Awareness

 Public education is a significant investment and an increasingly key part of our program

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# **Current Approach: Challenges**

- Various agencies and non-governmental organizations play roles in trying to improve water quality throughout Orange County
- Municipalities are under special permits, which are pushing us to invent water quality "solutions" as we go, with limited experience and only preliminary data

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# **Current Approach: Challenges**

- Millions of dollars are being spent on this approach
- Unclear as to what is working and what impact our efforts have on the entire system
- We need an integrated approach and the ability to regionally prioritize

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# **Regional Water Quality Vision**

- Project and water quality approach prioritization
- Stakeholder buy-in
- Improved water quality and reduced beach postings
- Sensible and appropriate water quality standards
- Efficient and coordinated BMP implementation (including water conservation)
- Stable, dedicated funding source(s)

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## **Regional Water Quality Vision**

- $\boldsymbol{\ast}$  Trust and concurrence of the Regional Boards
- ✤ Watershed-scale
- Implementation of measures for which that is most appropriate
- Governance structure that people trust and don't see as just more bureaucracy
- Building these concepts into future permit renewals
- Regional approach (in partnership with State) to proving up BMP technology

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## How to Govern

- Three Watershed Management Areas
- ✤ Regional, collaborative governance for each WMA
- Roles for Elected Officials, agency staff, & public
- Regionally funded slate of activities
- System-wide prioritization
- Fiscal accountability & equity





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# The State of State Bond Funds

- Lots of grants to award = lots of grant contracts to select, execute, & manage
- Project-by-project granting may not address large scale issues
- Decision making in Sacramento may not reflect regional priorities

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# Integrated Regional Water Management Plans

## ♦ Regions:

- ♦ define their own boundaries
- ♦ decide their own governance
- ♦ determine their own priorities
- design their own solutions
- State:
  - ♦ defines criteria for plans
  - manages one 'block grant' to a region for multiple agencies, multiple projects

# Santa Ana River Watershed Project Authority

- Plans completed in 2003 and 2005
  FoHBP participated
- Prop 50 Round I = \$25M for SAWPA member agencies
- Current plan update "One Water One Watershed"


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- ✤ Plan completed May 2006
- 150 ranked projects
- Prop 50 Round I announced Jan. 2007
- \$25M matching funds for 7 high priority projects

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# **Central Orange County WMA**

- Plan completed August 2007
- \* 26 priority A projects; 11 priority B projects
- Applied for \$10M matching funds for 13 high priority projects
- Prop 50 Round II announced Nov. 2007
- ✤ Update underway for Prop. 84 funding



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
