Jeremy Madsen

Executive Director, Greenbelt Alliance

Jeremy Madsen is the Executive Director of Greenbelt Alliance, the San Francisco Bay Area's leading smart growth and land conservation advocacy organization. Since his tenure began in 2008, Madsen has led Greenbelt Alliance in protecting over a million acres of Bay Area farms and natural areas and shaping good development plans for the region's large and small cities. As Executive Director, Jeremy Madsen sets and implements the organization's strategic goals and manages its operations. He is the leader of Greenbelt Alliance's policy and advocacy efforts to keep and improve what's special about the Bay Area.

Jeremy comes to Greenbelt Alliance from The San Francisco Foundation, where he helped to launch the Great Communities Collaborative and supported social equity, affordable housing, and smart growth efforts around the Bay Area. A graduate of George Washington University, he earned a master's degree in Environmental Studies from the University of Oregon.

He has also been helped to enforce the citywide Urban Growth Boundary to protect open space and encourage in-fill development.
